CAMP ERIN SERVES GRIEVING CHILDREN IN ANCHORAGE

Camp Is Available to Local Children for the First Time as Part of New York Life Foundation's \$600,000 Grant to The Moyer Foundation

Anchorage, AK, October 5, 2009 – Camp Erin, one of the largest networks of bereavement camps for children in the nation, held its first camp on September 25-28. A total of more than 40 children benefitted from these camps. The Moyer Foundation, founded by Major League Baseball's Philadelphia Phillies All-Star pitcher Jamie Moyer and his wife Karen, established Camp Erin in order to provide a safe and fun environment for children to grieve and heal after the loss of a loved one. Weekend-long camps are held in 28 cities across the country throughout the year.

“We are pleased to bring Camp Erin to children and families in the Anchorage area for the first time,” said Gary Pollock, Executive Director of The Moyer Foundation. “Forty two campers were able to participate because of a generous gift from the New York Life Foundation, which, along with other donors, makes it possible for all campers to attend Camp Erin free of charge. Dealing with bereavement is a challenge at any age, but children face unique hurdles and Camp Erin provides the encouraging, supportive environment necessary to help kids heal.”

The \$600,000 grant from the New York Life Foundation supports the expansion of Camp Erin nationwide by funding camps in eight markets including Anchorage. The grant also supports existing camps in Albany, Philadelphia and Seattle and will fund the expansion for new camps in St. Louis, Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Minneapolis.

“Helping children grow and learn is a cornerstone of the New York Life Foundation's *Nurturing the Children* initiative – and Camp Erin accomplishes this goal by providing an environment for children to cope with the loss of a loved one,” said Chris Park, president of the New York Life Foundation. “With local statistics indicating that roughly 5,000 children in the Anchorage area have experienced the loss of a loved one, it is a privilege to help as many grieving children as possible by playing a role in the healing process with an organization as effective as Camp Erin.”

Camp Erin is a grief camp designed for children and teens ages 6-17 who have experienced the death of a someone close to them. It is a weekend-long experience filled with traditional, fun, camp activities combined with grief education and emotional support -- lead by grief professionals and trained volunteers. There are currently 28 camps in 18 states. Through the Foundation's national "Campaign for Kids" the Moyer Foundation hopes to bring Camp Erin to children in more than 50 cities nationwide, including one in every Major League Baseball city.
